

THE HONORABLE JOAQUÍN CASTRO | TX-20



Joaquín Castro was born in San Antonio, Texas. A second generation Mexican American, he was raised on the city's Westside and is a proud product of the public school system. Joaquín left San Antonio to graduate with honors from Stanford University in 1996 and later attended Harvard Law School where he received his Juris Doctorate degree in 2000. In 2012, Joaquín was elected to serve in the U.S House of Representatives as a representative of Texas Congressional District 20, which covers a large portion of San Antonio and Bexar County. Joaquín serves on the House Armed Services Committee, as well as the House Foreign Affairs Committee. As a Congressman, Joaquín continues to be a tireless advocate for

those who call San Antonio home. From supporting military families to investing in education, Joaquín remains committed to helping mold an Infrastructure of Opportunity for San Antonians and Americans around the country.

THE HONORABLE RUBÉN HINOJOSA | TX-15



Congressman Rubén Hinojosa (D-TX) represents the 15th Congressional District of Texas. Elected in 1996, Congressman Hinojosa is serving his 8th term as a U.S. Representative and is regarded as a champion for the disadvantaged and a strong advocate for education, housing and economic development. Congressman Hinojosa currently serves on two House committees: the Committee on Education and the Workforce and the Committee on Financial Services. He was elected in November of 2012 as the Chairman of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus for the 113th Congress. On the House Financial Services Committee, Congressman Hinojosa is widely recognized as a leader on issues affecting the underserved,

from banking to housing. Prior to his election, Congressman Hinojosa served twenty years as President and Chief Financial Officer of a family-owned food processing company, H&H Foods. He is married to Martha Lopez Hinojosa and has one son, Ruben Jr., and four daughters Laura, Iliana, Kaitlin and Karén.

THE HONORABLE BARBARA LEE | CA-13



Congresswoman Barbara Lee is a forceful and progressive voice in Congress, dedicated to social and economic justice, international peace, and civil and human rights. First elected in 1998, she has aggressively represented the needs of the underserved and vulnerable people in her district and throughout the U.S. She has earned a reputation as an effective legislator who works in a bipartisan manner to achieve results in congressional committees. The Congresswoman has been a strong proponent of safe communities, affordable housing, the homeless, low income energy assistance, job training, making health care affordable and universal, just immigration policies, the establishment of a living wage, and

protection of the right of women to make decisions about their reproductive health. She is a former chair of the Congressional Black Caucus and the current Congressional Asian Pacific American Caucus Health Taskforce Chair. Before being elected to Congress, Congresswoman Lee served in the California State Assembly and in the California State Senate.

THE HONORABLE MICHELLE LUJAN GRISHAM | NM-1



Public service comes naturally to Congresswoman Michelle Lujan Grisham, a twelfth generation New Mexican who has dedicated her life to serving her community, fighting for seniors and improving access to quality health care. After law school, Lujan Grisham directed the Lawyer Referral for the Elderly Program of the New Mexico State Bar. Lujan Grisham fought to protect seniors from scam artists, safeguard them from abuse and neglect, and helped them remain in their homes. She was appointed by both Democratic and Republican governors to serve as Director of the State Agency on Aging, Cabinet Secretary of the Department of Aging & Long-Term Services, and Secretary of Health. She

also started a small business to oversee New Mexico's Medical Insurance Pool, providing access to health insurance for New Mexicans who were denied coverage. Prior to being elected to represent New Mexico's 1st Congressional District, Lujan Grisham was a Bernalillo County Commissioner.

THE HONORABLE BEN RAY LUJÁN | NM-3



Congressman Ben Ray Luján is a native New Mexican, born and raised in the community of Nambe near Santa Fe. Serving in his third term in Congress, Luján is continuing his efforts to stand up for New Mexico's families and fight for a stronger future for all Americans. As a member of the Energy and Commerce Committee, he is a strong advocate for investments in innovation, education, and health care that will contribute to stronger families, stronger communities, and a stronger economy. Rep. Luján serves as First Vice Chair of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus and Co-Vice Chair of the Congressional Native American Caucus. He also serves in the House Democratic Leadership as Chief Deputy Whip. Prior

to his election to Congress, Rep. Luján served as the Chairman of the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission.

THE HONORABLE GLORIA NEGRETE MCLEOD | CA-35



Congresswoman Gloria Negrete McLeod is proud to represent the communities of Bloomington, Chino, Montclair, Ontario, Pomona, and portions of Fontana and Rialto in California's 35th District. Congresswoman Negrete McLeod is a member of the historic Committee on Agriculture. The Committee has jurisdiction over agriculture, forestry, nutrition, water conservation, bio-terrorism, among other issues. She is also a member of the House Committee on Veterans' Affairs. This Committee reviews veterans' programs, examines current laws, and reports bills and amendments to strengthen existing laws concerning veterans. Gloria and her husband Gilbert L. McLeod, a retired police lieutenant, have lived in the

district for more than 43 years, raising 10 children, 27 grandchildren, and 25 great grandchildren.

THE HONORABLE GRACE F. NAPOLITANO | CA-32



Grace Flores Napolitano was born in Brownsville, Texas. After high school, she married and moved with her husband to California where they raised 5 children. First elected to Congress in 1998, Rep. Napolitano is currently serving her eighth term. Her Los Angeles County-based district covers several cities and communities in the San Gabriel Valley and East Los Angeles County areas. Napolitano has been a member of the House Committee on Natural Resources since the 106th Congress, and is currently the Ranking Member on the Subcommittee on Water and Power. She has been a long-time promoter of conservation, water recycling, desalination, and groundwater management as solutions to Southern California's

water needs. Napolitano co-chairs the bipartisan Congressional Mental Health Caucus, where she promotes access to mental health for children and adolescents, improved mental health resources for veterans, and increased mental health coverage by insurance providers. The Congresswoman is also a member and former Chairwoman of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus.

THE HONORABLE LUCILLE ROYBAL-ALLARD | CA-40



The first Mexican-American woman elected to Congress, Congresswoman Lucille Roybal-Allard represents California's 40th congressional district. The first Latina appointed to the House Appropriations Committee, she serves on two subcommittees: Homeland Security, and the Labor, Health and Human Services and Education Subcommittee, which oversees federal funding for public schools, workforce training, and health care initiatives. The first woman to chair the Congressional Hispanic Caucus (CHC), the Congresswoman currently serves as the chair of the CHC's Health Care Task Force. As Task Force Chair, she has championed efforts to pass health care reform, with a focus on improving the

quality and affordability of health services, prioritizing prevention and reducing the escalating costs of health care. The Congresswoman is an original co-author of the DREAM Act and a leader in immigration reform policy. The eldest daughter of the late Honorable Edward R. Roybal and Lucille Beserra Roybal, the Congresswoman is married to Edward T. Allard, III. Together, they have four children and seven grandchildren.

CATHY ABRAMSON, B.S.



Cathy Abramson (Sault Ste. Marie Tribe of Chippewa Indians) is the Chairperson and Bemidji Area representative of the National Indian Health Board (NIHB). She was elected to the Sault Ste. Marie Tribe's Board of Directors in 1996 representing Unit 1 and has continued to serve as a board member since that time. In addition, she presently serves as the Treasurer. She also serves on the Tribes traditional living and foods program planning committee, and participates in the Sault Ste. Marie culture committee, higher education committee, conservation committee, and has served as an advisor for the Sault Ste. Marie Chippewa Tribal Youth

Council. Cathy is actively involved with United Tribes of Michigan and the Midwest Alliance of Sovereign Tribes (MAST). She has a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration. Cathy's Spirit Name is Wabanung Quay. She is a member of the Wolf clan. She resides in Sault Ste. Marie, Michigan

ERIN ARMSTRONG, J.D.



Erin Armstrong is an attorney at the National Health Law Program (NHeLP) where she works to improve access to quality health care for low income and underserved individuals. Erin first joined NHeLP as a reproductive justice fellow in 2011. Prior to NHeLP, she coordinated a reproductive health grants program at the Society of Family Planning, advocated on behalf of communities living with HIV/AIDS at the New Mexico Department of Health, and worked to reform punitive drug policies. Erin is President Emerita and a current member of the national board of directors of Law Students for Reproductive Justice. She is also the recipient of the 2009 New Mexico Public Health Association Phil Lynch Legislative Award. Erin

received her law degree from the University of California, Berkeley, and her B.A. in sociology and social welfare from the University of New Mexico.

MATT A. BARRETO, PHD.



Matt A. Barreto is the co-founder of the polling and research firm Latino Decisions, and an Associate Professor of Political Science, and adjunct professor of Law at the University of Washington. In 2012 Time Magazine called Latino Decisions the "gold-standard in Latino American polling" and Barreto's research was recognized in the 30 Latinos who made the 2012 election by Politic365, listed in the Top 100 Global Thinkers of 2012 by the European Politics Magazine LDSP, was named one of the 16 leading Latino pundits by Huffington Post which said Barreto was "the pollster with his finger on the pulse of the Latino electorate." In 2013, he collaborated with Gabriel Sanchez on two major surveys of Latino

views towards the Affordable Care Act. Barreto is the author of two academic books, and more than forty scholarly research articles and book chapters that examine Latino public opinion, voting behavior, and race politics more generally in America.

CAROLINE BONHAM, MD., MSC.



An alumna of the RWJF Clinical Scholars Program, Dr. Bonham is a psychiatrist with a long standing interest in developing programs to increase access to behavioral healthcare in underserved communities. In her current role as the Director for Center for Rural and Community Behavioral Health, she oversees a 45 member interdisciplinary team focused on addressing health disparities in New Mexico through community engaged research, education, and clinical initiatives. Dr. Bonham is the medical director for the UNM Telepsychiatry program which, in partnership with the Indian Health Service Behavioral Health Center of Excellence, uses telehealth to provide direct clinical care, specialty

consultation, and training to rural communities across the U.S. She also serves as the consultant to the NM Behavioral Health Purchasing collaborative to develop policies and a statewide plan for the delivery of behavioral health services in New Mexico.

LISA CACARI STONE, PH.D., M.A., M.S.



Lisa Cacari Stone, Ph.D., M.A., M.S. is Assistant Professor at the Department of Family and Community Medicine and Senior Fellow, RWJF Center for Health Policy, University of New Mexico. Her research interests encompass the macro-level determinants of health and access to health care (e.g. migration, immigration policy, political ideologies), to the community level (e.g. social and contextual influences of substance use for immigrant women), to the individual level (e.g. psychosocial risks factors for hypertension management among Latinos). Dr. Cacari has 25 years of public health service and is trusted for her work in translating and disseminating data for policy making with governments,

community-based organizations and foundations. Dr. Cacari Stone completed her doctoral work at The Heller School, Brandeis University, post-doctoral research at the Harvard School of Public Health and served as a Congressional Health Policy Fellow with the late Senator Edward Kennedy under the mentorship of Dr. H. Jack Geiger.

JOHN CAPITMAN, PHD.



John Capitman is the Executive Director for the Central Valley Health Policy Institute and Nickerson Professor of Public Health, College of Health and Human Services, California State University, Fresno. Capitman brings an extensive background in research on health inequalities, long-term care, substance abuse and racial and ethnic disparities in cancer care. Capitman was formerly a professor and director of long-term care studies in the Schneider Institute for Health Policy at the Heller School for Social Policy and Management at Brandeis University. He is a leader of Place Matters: San Joaquin Valley and works with

diverse community and institutional partners to increase understanding and attention to social determinants of racial/ethnic health inequities in central California. Capitman also leads a health policy leadership program at Fresno State that engages leaders from throughout the region in exploring opportunities to address regional health problems.

CATHERINE DOWER, J.D.



Catherine Dower is an Associate Director at the UCSF Center for the Health Professions where for close to 20 years she has led health professions' research and policy efforts. At the Center, she directs the national Innovative Workforce Models in Health Care project and co-directs the Health Workforce Tracking Collaborative, which assesses health care workforce challenges including supply, maldistribution, and scopes of practice. Catherine served on the Committee of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Initiative on the Future of Nursing at the Institute of Medicine; and on the National Commission for Certifying Agencies. She is the author of numerous publications, including the 2013 Health Affairs

issue brief, "Health Gaps", a summary of health disparities in the US and what can be done about them. Catherine received her undergraduate and law degrees from the University of California at Berkeley and is licensed to practice law in the State of California.

PRESIDENT ROBERT G. FRANK, PHD.



Robert G. Frank took office as the 21st President of the University of New Mexico on June 1, 2012. The University of New Mexico is the state's largest institution of higher education and its flagship serving over 36,000 students across five campuses.

Dr. Frank previously served as Provost and Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs at Kent State University. He is the former dean of the College of Public Health and Health Professions at the University of Florida, where he also served as a professor in the Department of Clinical and Health Psychology. During his tenure at Florida, the College established the Public Health program and

reorganized what is now a CEPH-accredited College of Public Health.

Dr. Frank was a Robert Wood Johnson Health Policy Fellow in 1991-92 and worked with Senator Jeff Bingaman (D-New Mexico). Dr. Frank holds a doctorate in clinical psychology from the University of New Mexico. He is a Diplomate in Clinical Psychology from the American Board of Professional Psychology. Dr. Frank's scholarship focuses on two areas: psychological adjustment to catastrophic injury and health policy.

LUIS M. GARCIA, PSY.D.



As Vice President of Latino Program Development for Pacific Clinics, Dr. Garcia develops culturally competent programs that focus on Latino client and family needs. He has helped create a Clinics school-based program addressing suicide prevention for Latino children and adolescents, including individual, family and group services. Dr. Garcia received a Psy.D. degree from Newport University, a B.A. in Psychology from the University of Southern California. He was awarded a Ph.D. in Psychology from the University of Guadalajara, Jalisco, Mexico, and a Master's and Ph.D. in Gestalt Therapy from the Institute of Gestalt Therapy, Tijuana, B.C., Mexico. His areas of interest and expertise include socio-cultural

and psycho-social factors influencing psychopathology, assessment, and interventions for Latinos. He is a member of the Latino Behavioral Health Institute, Advisory Board Member to The National Hispanic and Latino Addiction Technology Transfer Center Network (ATTC), Co-Chair of the California Latino Mental Health Concilio, and N.A.L.E.O. (National Association of Latino Elected/Appointed Officials Educational Foundation), former member and past Chair of the California Mental Health Planning Council.



VERONICA C. GARCÍA, ED.D.

Veronica C. García, Ed.D., served as New Mexico's first Cabinet Secretary of Education. As secretary she advocated for the passage of the state's Pre-K Act and Hispanic Education Act, programs that extend the school year for at-risk children, and rigorous academic standards that were recognized nationally. Tribal/Interior Budget Council (TIBC), National Congress of American Indians (NCAI), DOJ Tribal Nations Leadership Council (TNLC), Albuquerque Area Health Board (AAIHB), HHS Secretary Tribal Advisory Committee (STAC), and Native American Rights Fund (NARF).

Governor of the Chickasaw Nation of Oklahoma, and previously served two terms as NCAI's First Vice-President.

PAMELYA HERNDON, J.D.



Pamelya Herndon is the Executive Director of the Southwest Women's Law Center where they use the power of law, research and creative collaborations to help build opportunities for girls and women in New Mexico. The Law Center advocates for economic security for women who are victims of domestic violence and sexual assault, for eliminating discrimination in athletic programs for girls in our public schools, and for ensuring that women have access to affordable health care. Pamelya has served as a Senior Litigation Attorney for the Internal Revenue Service and as a Deputy Cabinet Secretary in New Mexico state government. Rex Lee Jim, Vice President of the Navajo Nation, is the Kin Lichii' nii clan, born for the Tachii' nii clan. His maternal grandfather is the Kin Yaa' annii clan and his paternal grandfather is the Naakaii Dine' e clan. A poet, playwright, actor, producer, author, and educator, Vice President Jim is charged with overseeing education and health for the Navajo Nation. He earned a Bachelor of Arts degree from Princeton University and a Master of Arts degree from Middlebury College and for many years taught primary to postsecondary level courses, fostered cultural and language restoration, and developed innovative curriculum that enhanced student learning with technology. He conducts ongoing diplomacy on behalf of

the Navajo Nation with the United Nations, the Organization of American States, the Carter Center, and other international organizations to improve relations between nations states and indigenous people.

LEIGHTON KU, PHD., MPH.



Leighton Ku, PhD., MPH., is a Professor of Health Policy and Director of the Center for Health Policy Research at George Washington University. He is a nationally known expert on health policy, including health access for immigrants. He recently completed an analysis of the Senate bill on comprehensive immigration reform and has authored many papers on health insurance coverage and access for immigrants. In addition to his academic and research role, he serves on the Executive Board which is charged with developing and setting policy for the District of Columbia's Health Insurance Exchange. Dr. López co-edited a volume entitled, "Mapping 'Race': Critical Approaches to Health Disparities Research" (Rutgers University Press, 2013), which features "race" as a multidimensional, multilevel social construction that has profound methodological implications for health disparities research and policy. Her

book Hopeful Girls, Troubled Boys: Race and Gender Disparity in Urban Education (Routledge, 2003) focuses on Dominicans, West Indians, and Haitians to explain why girls are succeeding at higher rates than males. The daughter of Dominican immigrants, Dr. López was born and raised in NYC public housing. Spanish is her first language.

Kenneth Lucero is an enrolled member of the Pueblo of Zia and is also half Cochiti Pueblo. Since 1999, Mr. Lucero has actively served on the Zia Tribal Council and has worked as the Assistant Tribal Administrator for the Pueblo. Mr. Lucero serves on numerous health-related boards and committees on behalf of Zia and other tribes at the tribal, state and national level. His latest appointment is to the U.S. Health and Human Service Secretary's Tribal Advisory Committee, where he was elected as chairman of the committee by the national tribal representatives. Mr. Lucero is currently employed as the founding director for the RWJF Center for Native American Health Policy at UNM. Most recently, Mr. Lucero received his BA

in Native American Studies from the University of New Mexico, and his research interests include decolonizing health policies and institutions that administer health care.

NELBA MARQUEZ-GREENE, LMFT



Nelba Marquez-Greene, is the Director of Mental Health and Relational Wellness for Sandy Hook Promise. She is a clinical fellow of the American Association of Marriage and Family Therapy and has worked in private practice, community mental health and academic settings in the U.S. and Canada. Prior to joining SHP, Nelba worked as Coordinator for Klingberg Family Therapy Center's outpatient child and adolescent psychiatric clinic and was an adjunct faculty member at Central Connecticut State University. The Greene/Marquez-Greene family had only moved to Sandy Hook, CT from Canada four months before the shooting that took their beloved daughter's life. Ana Grace was 6 years old. Nelba has

chosen to commit her life to raising her surviving son who was also in the building the day of the shooting and addressing mental health issues through Sandy Hook Promise both at the local and national levels. Nelba holds a Bachelor of Music from the Hartt School and a Master of Arts in Marriage and Family Therapy from St. Joseph College.

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JAMAL MARTÍN, PHD., MPH.



Jamal Martín holds Lecturer and Clinical Faculty positions in Africana Studies, and Family & Community Medicine, University of New Mexico. His efforts in public health practice and epidemiology concentrates on health equity and social determinants of health, as well as, working on diverse panels, boards, and task forces within health, human services and education. A scholar-activist for cross-disciplinary approaches in health policy, Dr. Martín recently completed course work in Global Health Law Governance, Georgetown University Law. A former U.S. Public Health Service Trainee Scholar, and Attaché, Secretary-General, Office of the Secretariat, Asia Pacific Academic Consortium for Public Health, he

VALERIE ROMERO-LEGGOTT, M.D.



Dr. Roth graduated from George Washington University School of Medicine in Washington, D.C. He was the recipient of The George Washington University Award for Distinguished Alumni Achievement in 2007.

CORRINE SANCHEZ, MA



Corrine Sanchez, San Ildefonso Pueblo, is Executive Director of Tewa Women United, a Native women run and led organization. Ms. Sanchez is former President of the New Mexico Children's Safehouse Network, former board member of the Child Sexual Abuse Prevention Board, former member and Chair of the Native American Fund of the Santa Fe Community Foundation, former Vice-President of the NM Environmental Law Center and former President of the Native American Children's Alliance, a national organization, addressing child sexual abuse in Indian Country. Ms. Sanchez is one of sixteen visionary leaders across the country selected as the first cohort of the Move to End Violence. Ms.

Sanchez serves on the National Child Sexual Abuse Working Group for the Office of Victims of Crime. Ms. Sanchez is pursuing her PhD in Justice Studies as part of the first Pueblo PhD Cohort through the Santa Fe Leadership Institute at Arizona State University.

GABRIEL SANCHEZ, PHD.



Dr. Gabriel Sanchez is an Associate Professor of Political Science, and Interim Executive Director of the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Center for Health Policy at the University of New Mexico. He is also Director of Research for Latino Decisions and the Director of the American Economic Association Summer Training Program. Sanchez received his Ph.D in Political Science from the University of Arizona. His research explores the relationship between racial/ethnic identity and political engagement, Latino health policy, and minority legislative behavior. His work has been published in a wide range of academic journals and he is also a co-author of Hispanics and the U.S. Political System,

one of the most popular Latino Politics textbooks in colleges today. Sanchez has been the principal or co-principal investigator on several large-scale surveys, including the Latino Decisions National Poll on Health Care Reform (2009), and the Collaborative Multi-racial Post-election Study (2008). Professor Sanchez has provided political commentary to several state, national, and international media outlets.

Karen Waconda-Lewis is a native from Isleta/Laguna Pueblo. After initiation, she brought the native medicine into an urban American Indian health clinic in Albuquerque, NM and continues to expand the program to local hospitals, Indian Health Service, VA Hospital and surrounding organizations. She joins Western Medicine with Native healing in preventive health, mental health and overall well-being. She the founder and director of the Center for Native American Integrative Healing, LLC located in Santa Fe and Albuquerque, NM, where other

indigenous healers practice their traditional medicine and extends out to the community. She is a graduate of Spirit Rock Community Dharma Leader and regularly provides dharma teachings with integration of native teachings throughout NM, nationally and Insight Meditation Society-staff and teacher training. She has interconnected the native teachings with Vipassana teachings into ceremonies and sweat lodges. She is co-founder of the Annual Indigenous and Native Healer's Silent Retreats and Albuquerque POC and Allies Sangha.

VICKIE YBARRA, RN, MPH, MA



Vickie Ybarra is currently starting her fourth year as an RWJF Doctoral Fellow in Political Science at the University of New Mexico. Her research interests include health policy, the social determinants of health, immigration policy, and Latino politics. She holds previous degrees in Nursing and Public Health from the University of Washington.
