Most Important Issues


Most important issues the President and Congress should address

Today (February 2013)	November 2012
1. Immigration reform (58%)	1. Economy/Jobs (53%)
2. Economy/Jobs (38%)	2. Immigration reform (35%)
3. Education (19%)	3. Education (20%)
4. Health care (15%)	4. Health care (14%)

23% jump in only three months time!


Priority across entire Latino electorate

Percent who think it is extremely or very important for Congress to address immigration this year.




Priority across entire Latino electorate

Economy should not stifle CIR legislation

Some say Congress should put all their focus on fixing the economy, and address immigration later. Others say immigration is just as important and Congress should address both issues this year



WHY DOES IMMIGRATION REMAIN SALIENT TO LATINO VOTERS?

Three Reasons Immigration Matters Now


1. Congress is talking about it (extensive coverage)

2. Latinos care about it

3. Different this time: on heels of national awareness of Latino political/electoral impact

Have you heard or read anything in the news about the immigration reforms Congress is considering?




Percent who know about current immigration policy debate

Latino voters know undocumented people


Do you personally know someone who is an undocumented immigrant?

Familiarity with undocumented spiked


In two years, the share of Latino voters that know someone undocumented increased by +10%



Latino voters are close to the undocumented


Among the undocumented immigrants you know,

Are they: family, friends, or both?




Latino voters touched by deportations

Latino voters touched by DACA


Do you personally know anyone who applied for, or who is eligible to apply for DACA?

(deferred action)


Know applicant(s) 22% Know person/people 18% eligible Don't know anyone 65% eliglible/applied

WHAT POLICIES DO LATINOS WANT? AND WHAT CAN REPUBLICANS GAIN?

Preferred Citizenship Provision



Pathway to citizenship: sooner is better



Implications for the Latino vote...

Four Democrats and four Republicans in Senate are working on a plan that includes pathway to citizenship.

If GOP leaders work to get votes and pass the bill, would you consider voting GOP in the future?

More likely GOP vote	32%
Less likely GOP vote	13%
No effect	49%
Don't know	7%

Obama voters: 26% more likely

Independents: 35% more likely

Age 18-39: 38% more likely

Implications for the Latino vote...

If pathway to citizenship bill passes the Senate, but gets defeated by House Republicans,

Would that make you more or less likely to vote Republican in the future?

More likely GOP vote	8%
Less likely GOP vote	39%
No effect	47%
Don't know	6%

Obama voters: 50% less likely

Independents: 32% less likely

Age 18-39: 36% less likely

Implications for the Latino vote...

More or less likely to vote Republican if GOP takes lead role in passing v. blocking CIR with path to citizenship

-

	Passing	Blocking
More likely GOP vote	32%	8%
Less likely GOP vote	13%	39%
No effect	49%	47%
Don't know	7%	6%

Democrats 25% more likely (pass)

Republicans 8% less likely (block)

With only 23% of Latino vote in 2012, GOP does not have Latino votes to spare...

Concluding thoughts

- 1. Support and Demand for CIR crosses all demographic groups among Latinos.
- 2. Social closeness between Latino voters and non-citizen immigrants clearly enhances the importance of reform.
- 3. Virtually no support for expansive and unreasonable waiting periods.
- 4. Republicans may yield significant political gain if they can more forward on this issue in a constructive fashion.
