Sponsors:

America's Voice

- 500 Latino registered voters
- □ Conducted May 25 June 1
- Respondents selected at random
- Landline, cell and online blended sample
- □ Nominal margin of error is +/- 4.4%
- Interview in Spanish or English at subject's discretion

Latinos are the key electorate

- Both parties stand to gain or lose Latino support based upon their positions and actions on CIR.
- LD analysis finds Latino voters could determine outcome in 30+ competitive U.S. House districts (stay tuned)
- □ In 2014 Latinos will be critical in close elections for Senate and Governor (AZ, NV, CO, FL, MI, NM, PA)

Immigration reform is a priority


With all the different issues Congress must address, how important is immigration reform THIS YEAR?



Have you heard or read anything in the news about the immigration reforms Congress is considering?




Like all Americans, Latinos support CIR

One plan would increase border security and enforcement of our existing immigration laws, require employers to verify that all employees have legal status, and provide a pathway to citizenship for undocumented immigrants, as long as they pass a background check, study English, and pay a fine.





Favorability and immigration approval


Favorability and immigration policy track closely









Implications for the Latino vote...

More or less likely to vote Republican if the GOP takes leadership role in **PASSING** immigration reform with path to citizenship

More likely vote GOP	44%	45%
Less likely to vote GOP	8%	8%
No effect	42%	38%

Democrats: 44% more likely

Prior GOP Vote: 49% more likely

Over \$80K: 53% more likely

Implications for the Latino vote...

More or less likely to vote Democratic if the Democrats takes leadership role in **PASSING** immigration reform with path to citizenship




Do you personally know an undocumented immigrant?


Community ties: Latino voters and undocumented immigrants



The Latino vote in 2014


16 months out, Democrats currently hold a better than 3-to-1 edge over Republicans in the 2014 midterms

Thinking about the elections for U.S. Congress in November 2014, do you think you will vote for...




Who gets the blame if CIR fails?
