


Texas is one of four majority-minority states. (CA, HI, NM, TX)




Texas Partisanship and Latino Voters

Adding "leaners" 67% Democrat 26% Republican



Texas Presidential GOP Vote 1992-2012


Latino voters trending away from GOP.


Texas Democratic Vote 1992-2012

Not registered: 2,215,000




2012 Voter Participation Among Registered Voter Population


Once registered, turnout is relatively high for all groups.

Texas Hispanic Voter Impact Scenarios


Presidential vote outcome adjusting two variables:

- 1. Hispanic voter turnout rate
- 2. Percent Hispanic vote for Republican candidates
- Both parties stand to secure their future based on those two factors.






2012 Latino Voter Reason for Voting

Co-ethnic support motivation essentially even with Democratic party support in Texas.

Clear outreach opportunities.




2012 Latino Voter Reason for Voting

Comparing Western states with similar Hispanic demography

Texas retained more Hispanic GOP support relative to other Western states with similar Latino demography.

Absence of antiimmigrant pied piper, or signature punitive policy buffered Texas GOP.






Texas Republican Primary Candidates on Immigration Policy and Border Region

Perry and W. Bush-era policy positions and overtures out of favor with 2014 GOP candidates, and influential segments of state party.


- Tough talk on immigration and border a cornerstone of GOP primary campaigns
 - Repeal in-state tuition
 - Calls to rescind 14th Amendment
 - Ads, debates, interviews, social media emphasis on ills of illegal immigration
 - Frequent pejorative references to South Texas and Border despite much higher crime rates in other parts of state: third world, fraudulent voters, crime, lack law and order

Considering all your family, friends, coworkers, and others you know, do you happen to know someone who is an undocumented immigrant?




Texas Latino voter enthusiasm and 2012 candidate immigration positions



GOP vote if party supports CIR

Texas GOP has much to gain, 36% of Hispanic voters more likely to vote for Republican if they pass CIR, second only to Arizona.

If the GOP took a leadership role in supporting CIR with a path to citizenship for undocumented immigrants, would you be more/less likely to support future GOP candidates?



Texas GOP: Model No More?

- Current slate of candidates using distinctly non-Texas campaign tactics that spurn Hispanic voters.
 - National party brand further damaged
 - Over-estimate appeal to non-Latinos, industry (deep ties)
- □ Texas used to be the party example for outreach, right the course with Hispanic voters.
 - George W. Bush Hispanic-majority county wins

The Future of Party Competition in Texas: Come and Take It

- Expanded Hispanic electorate can leverage future of either party
 - □ GOP could secure a bright-red future: return to model outreach and policy.
 - Democrats could make it competitive: invest in infrastructure, voters.
- Latino voters motivated by community interest, not party enthusiasm
 - 20 yrs GOP statewide control didn't win over Hispanics.
 - No evidence Hispanic voters are waiting to surge for Democrats either.
- Extensive, long-term investment in voter engagement
 - Demographics alone will not make Texas competitive.
 - Establishing relationships with new and alienated voters.
