



- Landline, Cell phone, online blended sample to ensure representative portrait of Latino voters nationwide


What are the most important issues facing the Hispanic community that you want elected officials to address





Approve or disapprove of handling of immigration policy: October 2014












## Latino enthusiasm towards Obama





## Immigration as a 2014 theme


How important is the issue of immigration in your decision to vote, and who to vote for in this election?



#### How likely consider a vote for Marco Rubio?



#### How likely consider a vote for Jeb Bush?



Christie supported state DREAM Act in New Jersey, but vetoed a measure that would allow DREAMers to access state financial aid for college and refused to say his position on national immigration reform

#### How likely consider a vote for Chris Christie?





#### How likely consider a vote for Rand Paul?



#### How likely consider a vote for Hillary Clinton?



## The Latino vote in review

- Like all Americans, Latinos are frustrated with the lack of progress on immigration reform
- For Latinos, the issue is personal, symbolic and salient – a clear majority of <u>Latino voters</u> know an undocumented immigrant
- Both parties stand to lose support if they continue to take the Latino vote for granted
