






2014 Election Eve Poll

4200 Latino voters 10 state polls Oct 29th - Nov 3rd National +/-1.9%State +/- 4.9%

Election Eve Methodology

Language of choice at point of contact;

All live callers;

Landline and cellphones

Sample on extreme high-propensity vote history plus new registrants;

Screen on complete vote or certainty to vote;

Past samples validated at 88% positive for cast ballot.

UNDERINVESTMENT IN LATINOS AND THEIR ISSUES CONTRIBUTED TO A DIFFICULT NIGHT FOR DEMOCRATS AND A MOSTLY WHITE ELECTORATE FOR **REPUBLICANS.**


National Summary

- Latinos were on the losing end of close electoral contests in most influence states.
- Latino margin likely outside the margin of victory (and hence pivotal) in RI, CT, CO, VA
- Across most contests, Latino vote share was less Democratic than 2, 4, and 6 years ago.

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
House of Representatives





View of Republican Party Toward Latino Community






Which statement do you agree with most? I am voting in 2014 because I want to support the:


Mobilization

Were you contacted about voting or registering to vote?






Reasons for Not Voting in 2014

National oversample of 200 nonvoting Latinos

MoE is +/-6.9% 25% say schedule doesn't allow enough time off to go vote


- □ 24% don't know where polling place is
- 19% frustrated by bad candidates
- 14% of non-voters said they did not proper voter photo ID





If President Obama enacts executive order before the end of this year would that make you more/less enthusiastic about the Democratic Party into the future?










Colorado Vote: Congress and Governor

Udall on Immigration

While 46% of Colorado Latinos correctly identified Udall as pro-CIR, 47% reported not knowing and 6% thought he was opposed.

For Gardner, 21% mistakenly believed he supported CIR while only 38% knew he was opposed. Another 40% didn't know Gardner's position.


By any measure, this is a messaging fail for Udall.

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Colorado


- Story of Colorado is one of under-mobilization and a tragic mis-messaging to Latino voters.
- Latino voter priorities virtually unmentioned in Udall campaign.
- Latinos even uncertain of immigration positions of both Gardner and Udall.



North Carolina Summary


- Latinos gave Hagan the smallest vote share in any state we surveyed, at only 63%.
- Immigration was highly important to Latino voters and her position, and administrative inaction, likely had something to do with her performance.



Nevada Summary


- Governor Brian Sandoval substantially improved his position in the Latino electorate;
- Significant policy actions on priorities of the Latino community;
- Though he faced only token opposition, his vote percent suggests the availability of Latino votes to Republicans who address community needs and issues.

Texas Summary

- 44
- Wendy Davis lost considerable ground among Latinos compared with past cycles.
- Abbott did make concerted efforts to campaign to Latino voters.
- Texas still requires significant investment for Latino political power to be realized.


Important Texas Polling Issues

- Some reports of Exit Polls claiming Latino vote for Abbott in the 42% range.
- Complete non-sense, again reflecting the sampling design of the Exit Polls.
- Find out what share of interviews were completed in Spanish, the distribution of precincts selected, and the representation of the Rio Grand Valley.







Support Increase Minimum Wage to \$10.10






Carbon pollution & climate change




Block Executive Action Impact on GOP
