
Methodology

- Texas sample N=464 Latino adults, margin of error +/-4.5%
- Florida sample N=369 Latino adults, margin of error +/- 5.1%
- Conducted online
- English or Spanish, respondent's preference


Immigration Reform Policy Options (Florida Respondents)




Ties to Undocumented, DACA, and Detained/Deported (Florida Respondents)

Percent "yes" responses: know undocumented, DACA applicants, and/or someone detained or deported for immigration reasons




View of Party on Latino Outreach (Florida Respondents)


On the whole, what are the most important issues facing the country that you think Congress and the President should address?

On the whole, what are the most important issues facing the [Hispanic/Latino] community that you think Congress and the President should address?






Immigration reform and the 2018 vote

Each respondent was randomly assigned to receive just one of the four possible vote scenarios:



Dream Act and the 2018 Florida Latino vote





Hispanic Texans disagree with current state and federal immigration policies





Hispanic Texans Ties to Undocumented, DACA, and Detained/Deported




Hispanic Texans View of Party on Latino Outreach




