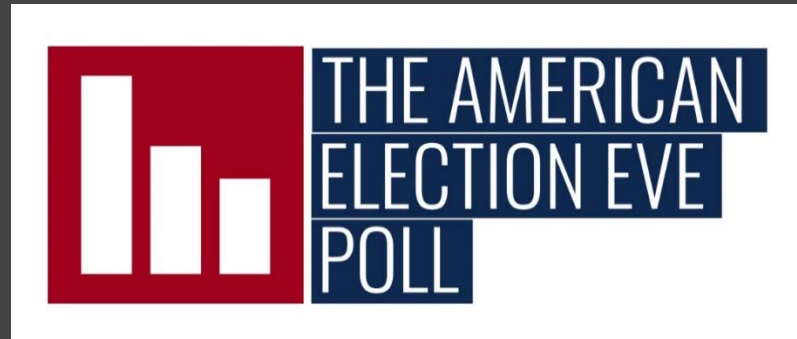

The American Election Eve Poll

- Exit polling has increasingly come under fire for not providing an accurate and representative sample of all voters in a state or district
- Since 2010 we have been working with partners to provide more accurate data on how minority and immigrant communities have voted and why
- This year we have a large and robust sample that includes:
 - Latinos, blacks, AAPIs, whites and Native Americans
 - 70 most competitive battleground House seats
 - 6 states with competitive elections

The American Election Eve Poll

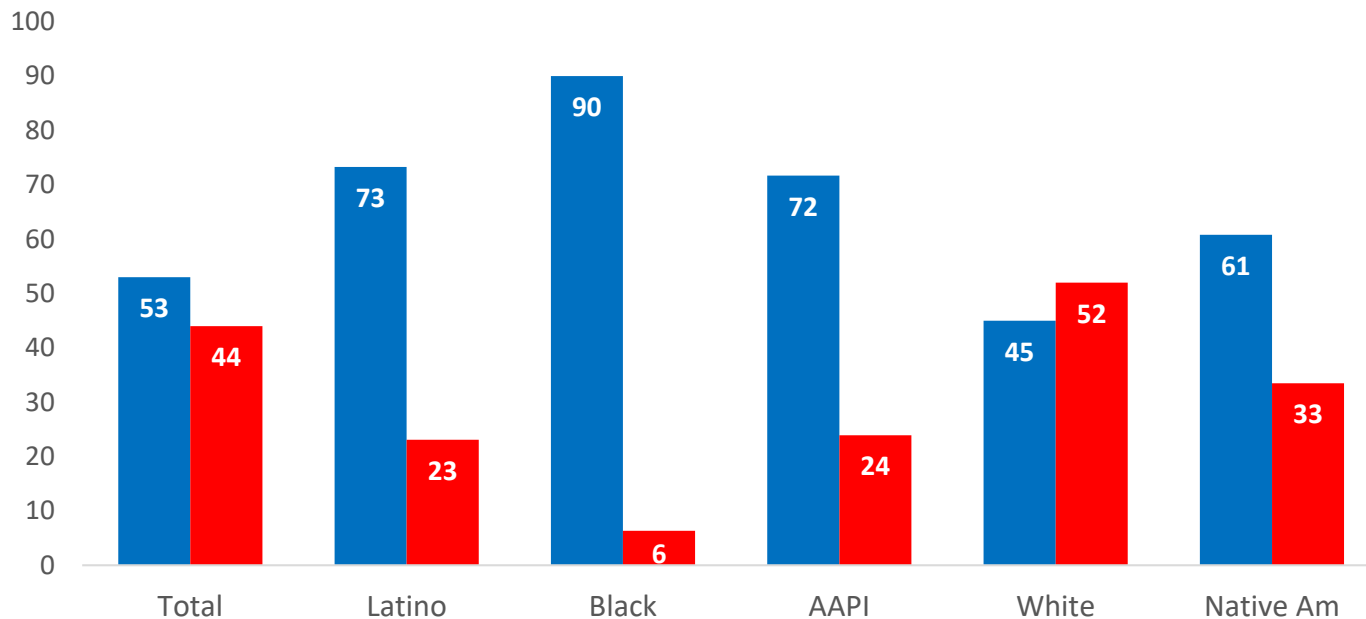
- Total sample of n=9,425 Americans who voted in 2018
- Margin of error of +/- 1 % full samples, +/- 2% for House battleground
- Field dates October 31 – November 6, 2018
- Minimum N=600 each group: Latino, African American, Asian American or Pacific Islander, Native American, and white non-Hispanic
 - Due to sample size considerations, Native Americans drawn from 50-state national sample, all other groups drawn only from the 70 competitive districts
- Respondents randomly selected from voter file and contacted by cell phone, landline, and via email, verified to be registered to vote, voted early or certain to vote on election day
- Available in English, Spanish, Chinese, Korean, Vietnamese, Tagalog, Hmong

In the election for U.S. House of Representatives, did you vote for the Democratic candidate or Republican candidate?



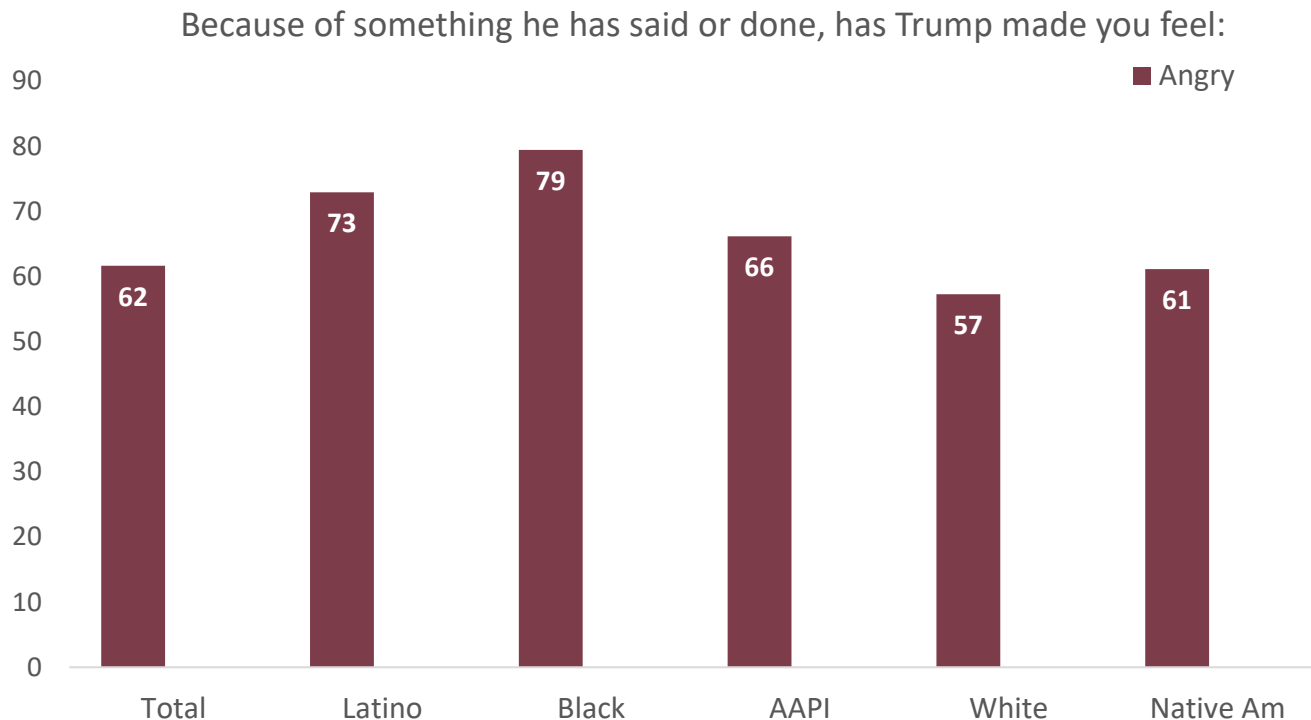

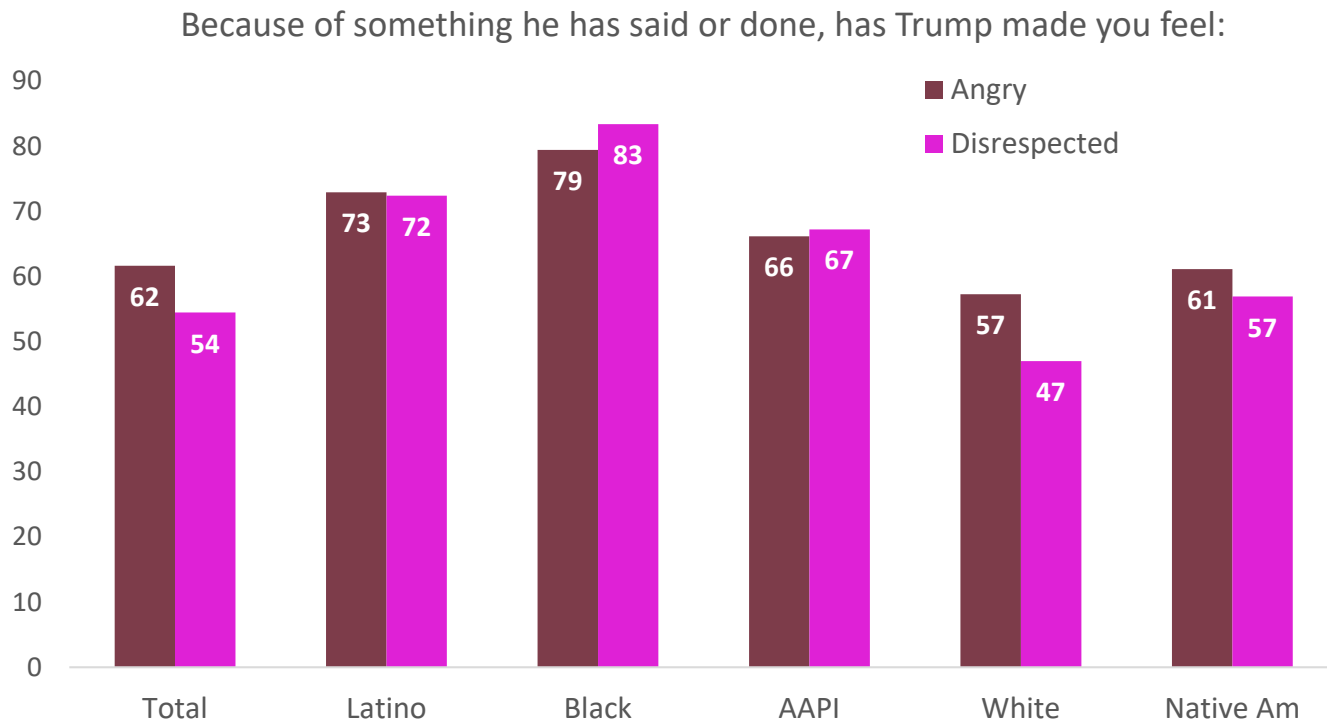

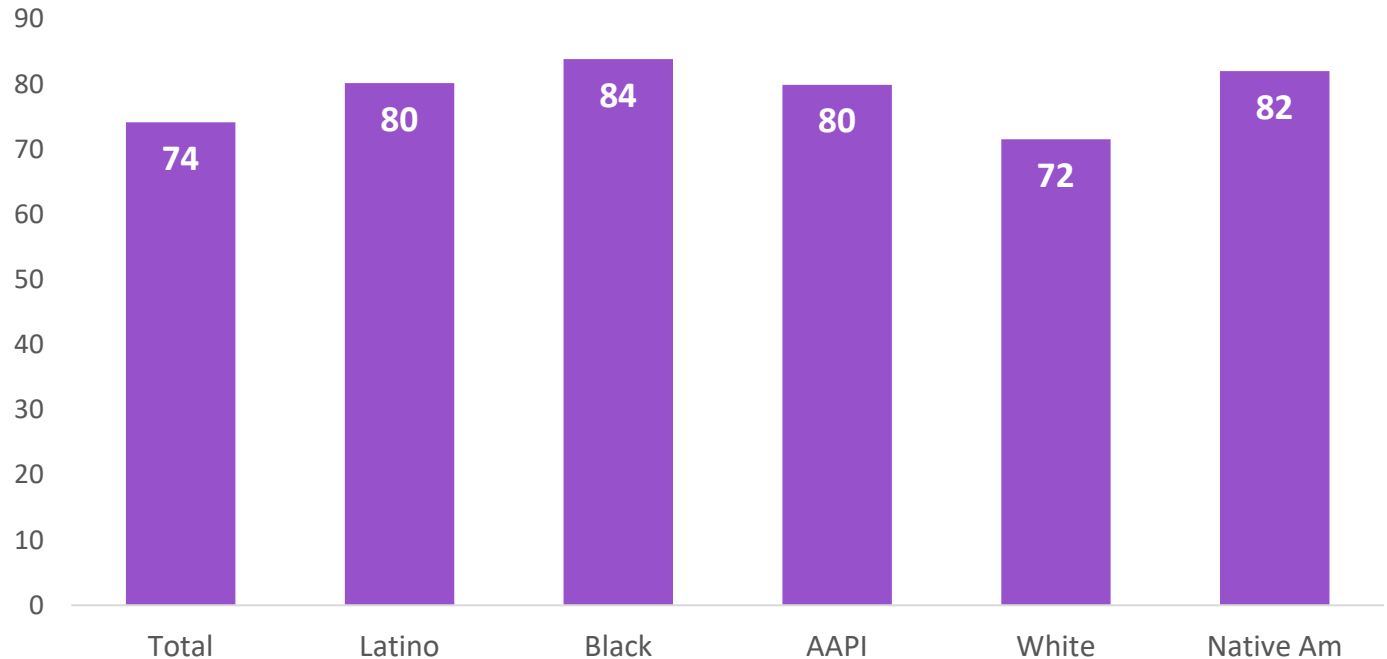

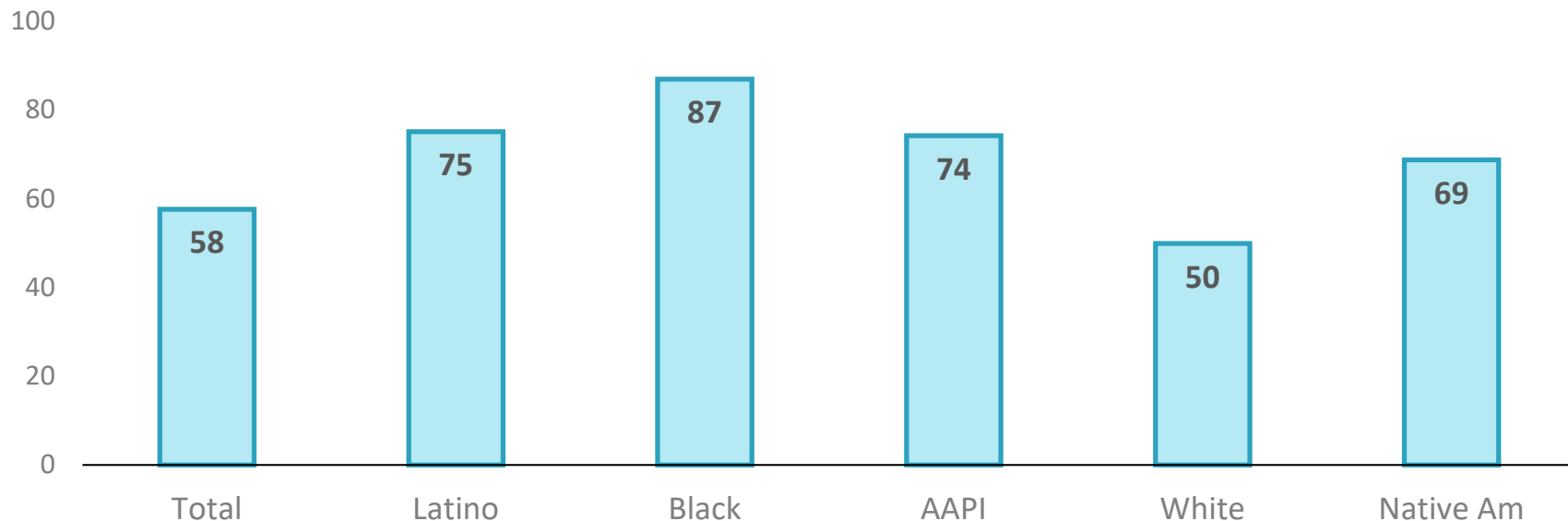

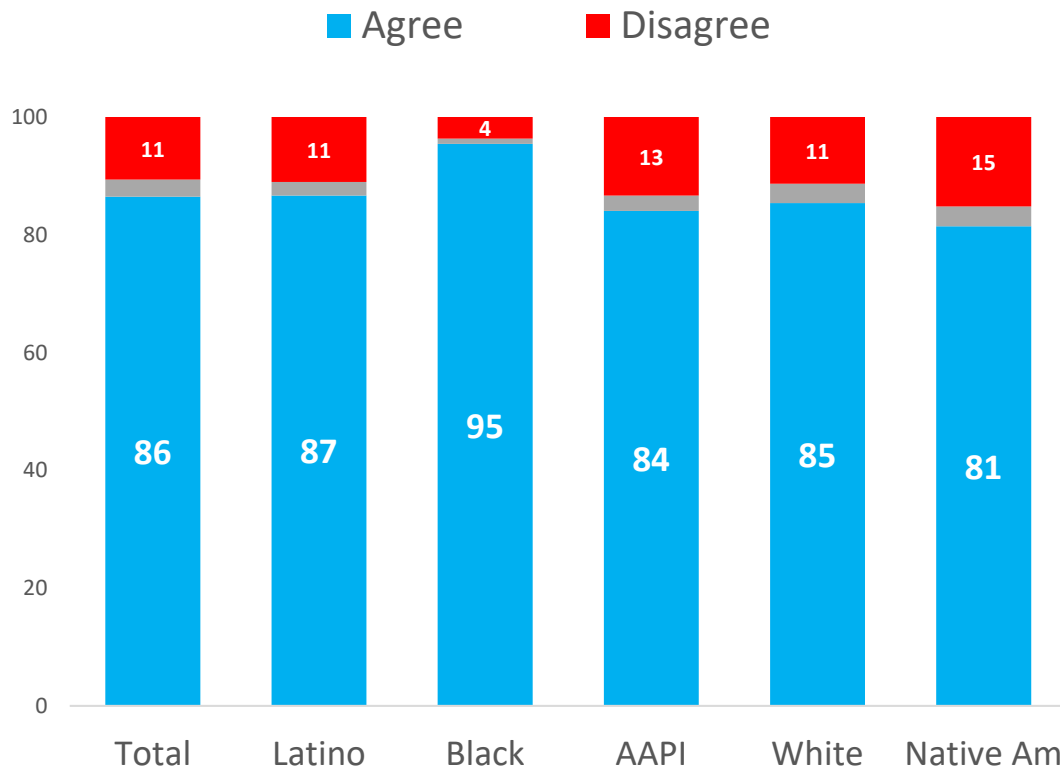
■ Immigrants just want to provide a better life for their families, just like you and me. I support legislation to make America more welcoming to immigrants

■ America has too many illegal immigrants, they hurt the economy, bring crime and gang violence to our cities. We have to crack down on illegal immigration



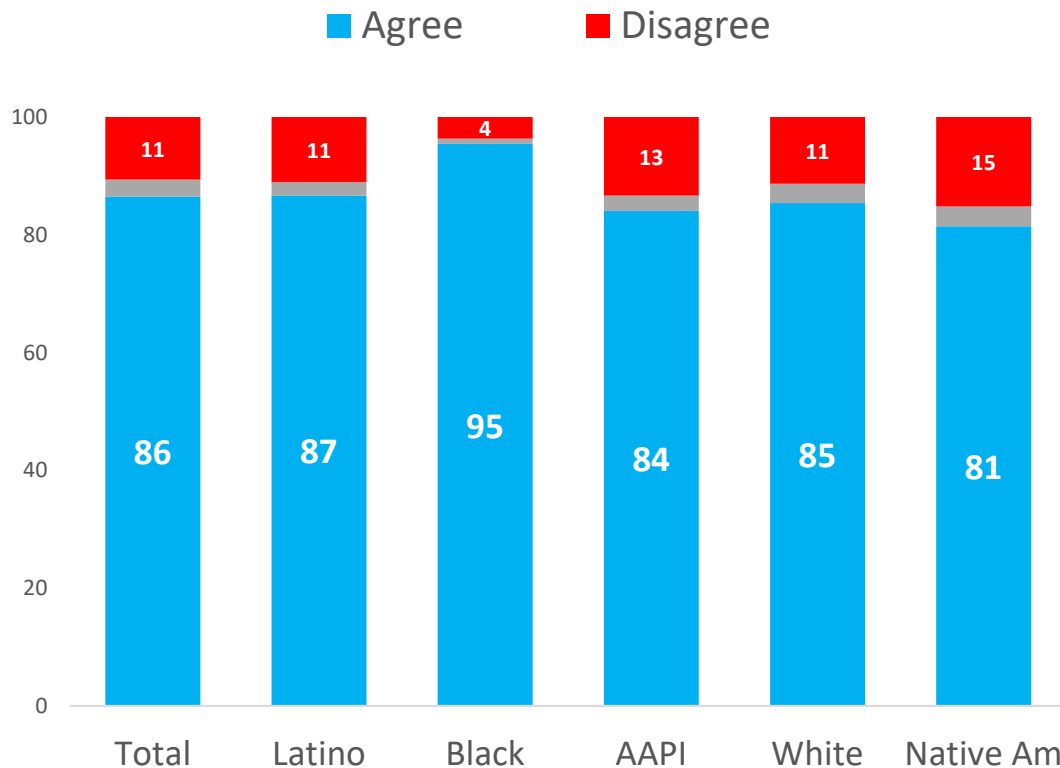

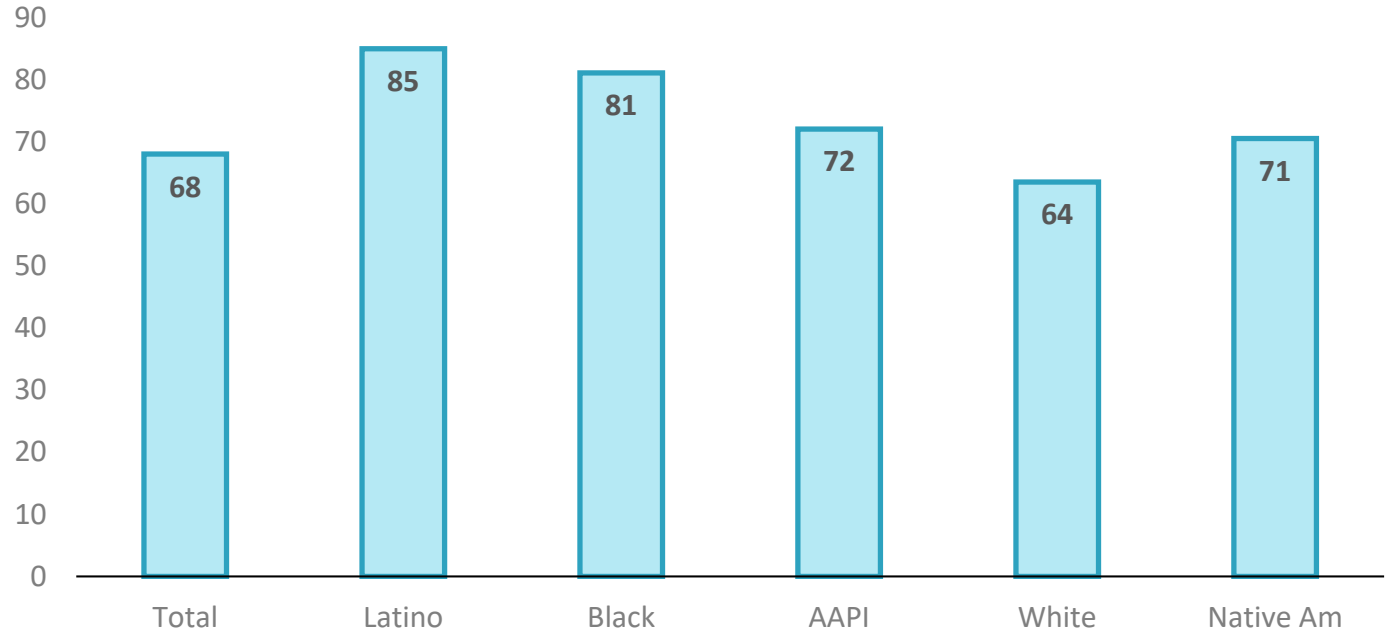

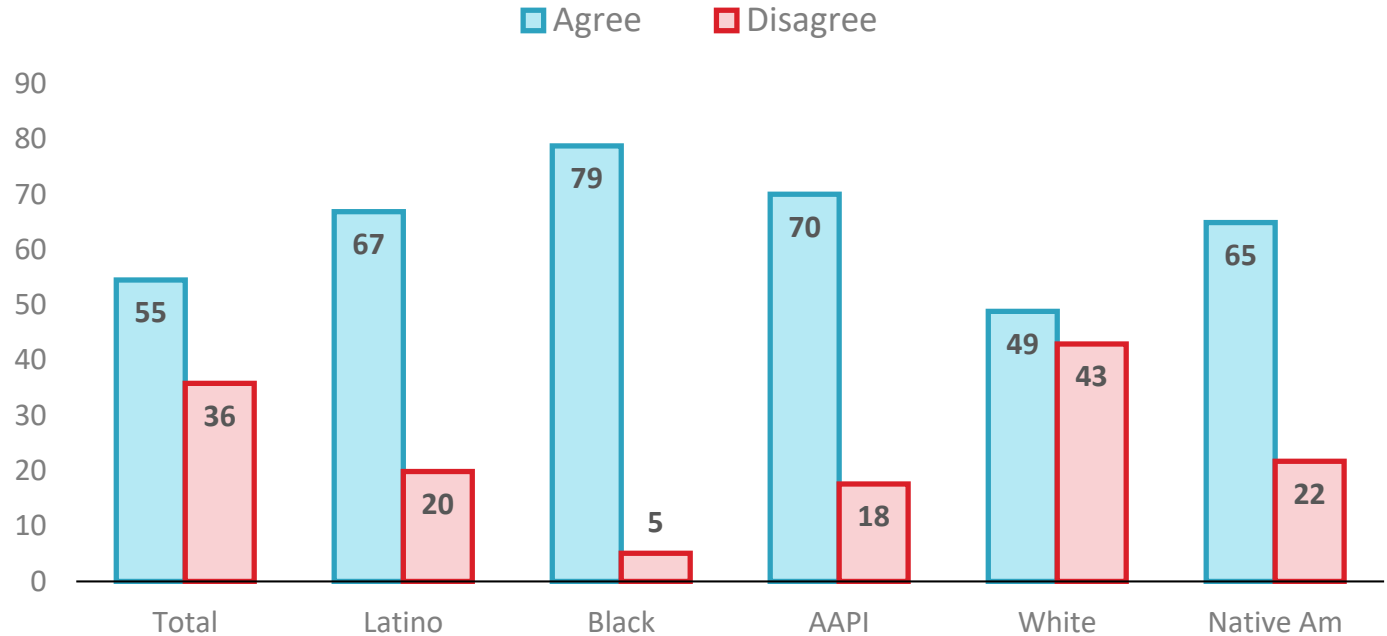

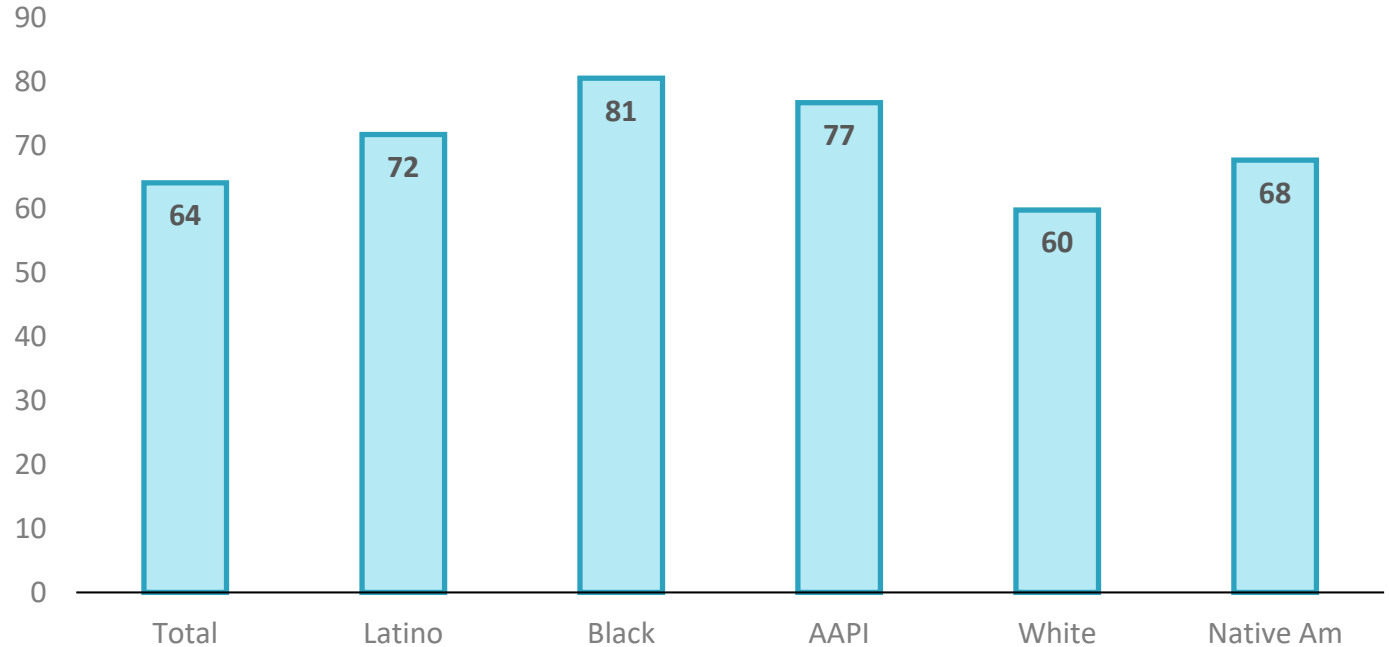

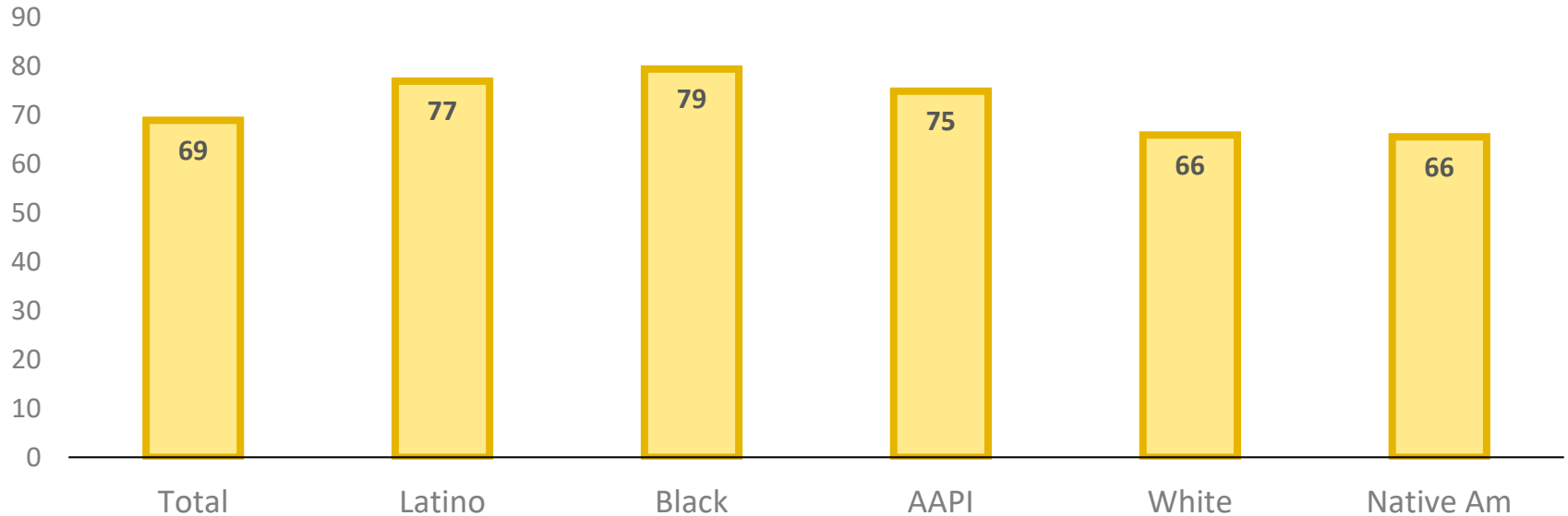
