

2018 American Election Eve Poll

- Sample: 9,425 Americans who voted in 2018
- Field dates: October 31 November 6, 2018
- Groups sampled: Latino, African American, Asian American or Pacific Islander Native American, and non-Hispanic White.
- Geographies sampled: national (Native Americans), 70 battleground congressional districts (Latino, African American, AAPI samples), targeted states (California, Arizona, Nevada, Texas, Georgia, Florida).
- Sampling frame: voter files, verified voters (early voters and those certain to vote on election day).
- Interview mode: cell phone, landline, online
- Languages: English, Spanish, Chinese, Korean, Vietnamese, Tagalog, Hmong

2018 AAPI Election Eve Poll

2,505 AAPI voters (margin = \pm 2%) Battleground sample of 600 (\pm 4%) State samples in CA, FL, GA, NV, TX (\pm 5%) Ethnic samples 455 Chinese (\pm 5%) 522 Filipino (± 4%) 525 Indian ($\pm 4\%$) 174 Japanese (\pm 7%) 177 Korean (± 7%) 291 Vietnamese (\pm 6%) 73 Pacific Islander (\pm 11%) 288 Other Asian $(\pm 6\%)$ Interviews available in English, Chinese, Filipino, Hmong, Korean, Vietnamese




Key Take-Aways


- 1) AAPIs overwhelmingly favored Dems over Reps in 2018.
- 2) Independents, women, young voters leaned heavily Dem.
- 3) AAPI voters were angry at Trump and opposed GOP agenda.
- 4) AAPI voters want positive, progressive policy reform.
- 5) Unusually high levels of outreach and engagement.






In the Election for House of Representatives, You Voted For



What are the most important issues facing the Asian American community that politicians should address?




Democratic Vote Share by Most Important Issue

Emotional Drivers in 2018



- ✓ 72% agree "Trump and the Republicans are normalizing sexism and sexual harassment against women."



The Affordable Care Act passed by Congress and the President ...


... should be repealed.

Gender Equity


Employers should be required to pay women and men the same wages for the same work. Sexual harassment against women continues to be a major problem in our country.

Congress should enact stricter gun laws.


Congress should pass the DREAM Act.

The practice of law enforcement using a person's ...



Universities should ...



From Swing Voters to Solid Democrats


AAPI voters have shifted from a "swing vote" to a solidly Democratic electorate

Which statement do you agree with most?


 A majority of AAPIs agree that Dems are doing a good job of AAPI outreach;

 Only 1 in 4 say the same about the GOP.




Unusually high mobilization
