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

Minority and immigrant voters drove the Blue Wave in the U.S. House elections and especially in California


While the white vote was decidedly less Republican than in 2016 In the election for U.S. House of Representatives did you vote for the Democrat or Republican in your district?

A majority of voters of all races and ethnicities were upset by Trump, not inspired














Attacking immigrants created a backlash

Voters want progress on immigration



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
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
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WHAT DO OFFICIAL ELECTION RETURNS TELL US ABOUT LATINO ENGAGEMENT?

% Change in Ballots Cast 2014-2018 California Los Angeles, Orange, San Diego, and Ventura Counties (N ~ 6,500)



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

What did we learn about 2018

- Minority voters in California were greatly engaged, both through campaigns and through self-mobilization
- Minority voters were angry and supported candidates who stood up for their issues: self-respect, anti-racism, and prohealth care
- Continued investment in Latino, black and AAPI communities has the greatest opportunity for short, medium, and longterm gains, the demographic changes are happening, and they aren't stopping



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The American Election Eve Poll

- Exit polling has increasingly come under fire for not providing an accurate and representative sample of all voters in a state or district
- Since 2010 we have been working with partners to provide more accurate data on how minority and immigrant communities have voted and why
- This year we have a large and robust sample that includes:
 - Latinos, blacks, AAPIs, whites and Native Americans
 - 70 most competitive battleground House seats
 - > 6 states with competitive elections

The American Election Eve Poll

- Total sample of n=9,425 Americans who voted in 2018
- California sample n=1,220
- Margin of error of +/- 2.8% CA sample, +/- 4.8% per each racial group
- Field dates October 31 November 6, 2018
- Minimum N=400 each group: Latino, African American, Asian American or Pacific Islander
- Respondents randomly selected from voter file and contacted by cell phone, landline, and via email, verified to be registered to vote, voted early or certain to vote on election day
- Available in English, Spanish, Chinese, Korean, Vietnamese, Tagalog, Hmong
