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Survey Methodology

- Telephone survey of Latino registered voters in four key battleground states (Colorado, Florida, New Mexico, Nevada)
- All interviews conducted by bilingual Latino interviewers
- Latino Decisions surveyed 1,600 Latino registered voters, Aug 18 – Sept 10, for a total of 400 interviews in each state, with a margin of error of +/- 4.7% for each state
- Database of registered voters
- Largest sampling of Latino registered voters in these important states for this election.




Latino interest in the election is at record levels in these four important states




Despite low support in the primary, Latinos now support Obama at higher levels than Kerry or Gore


Question: If the 2008 election for President was held today who would you vote for?








Like many Americans, Latino voters are worried about the future of Social Security


Question: Overall, how do you think the social security system for retirement is working in the U.S.


Question: Which candidate do you trust to do a better job at **Improving the Economy**?








Question: Which candidate do you trust to do a better job at **Creating more jobs?**






Question: Which candidate do you trust to do a better job at handling **the situation in Iraq?**
