


# COVID-19 IMPACT ON LATINOS AND VIEWS ON THE HEROES ACT COLORADO RESULTS


On the whole, what are the most important issues facing your community that you think Congress and the President should address? (Record up to three responses)



#### Latino Focus on COVID-19 Crisis

In total, **86**% of Latinos in Colorado are following COVID-19 news, with 60% following "very closely".




## Experience with CARES Act

- Millions of Latino families and businesses <u>did not</u> receive any support from the CARES Act, including:
  - 43% of Latino households in Colorado did not receive any support from CARES Act.

67% of Latinos in Colorado believe the initial stimulus was not enough, that most people actually need more to get through the next couple of months.






#### Prevalence of COVID-19 Among Latinos in Colorado

(Have you or a family member or friend become ill due to the coronavirus? Percent "yes" illustrated) (Have you/anyone you know, wanted but been unable to get tested for coronavirus? Percent "yes" illustrated)

Nearly one in four Latinos in Colorado know someone, or have themselves, become ill due to coronavirus.

Similarly, more than one in four Latinos in Colorado themselves, or someone they know, would like to get tested but has not been able to do so.




### Huge Personal Financial Losses and Stress

Nearly one-third of Latino households in Colorado (31%) have experienced a iob loss.


57% of Latino households in Colorado have experienced either a job loss or a pay cut. 18% had BOTH job losses and pay cuts.

17% have lost their employer-provided health insurance.

# Hard Hits to Colorado's Latino Parents with Children in School

- 74% of Latino parents in Colorado worry their kids are falling behind because they've missed so much school.
- 42% attempted to act as the home-school teacher to their children as schools went online.
- 19% do not have enough computer equipment to accommodate everyone in the home who is now working and going to school online.
- > 27% online school has been difficult because of technical problems.

# Hard Hits to Latino Small-Business Owners and Self-employed

- One in five Latino entrepreneurs in Colorado (20%) shutdown altogether, or lost significant revenue due to temporary closing.
- Among them, 34% had trouble getting a loan under the initial stimulus bill.
- Among those working and schooling children at home
  - > 88% received <u>no support</u> to cover costs for equipment, wifi or data plans needed to complete work and school assignments.

#### TRUST IN A TIME OF CRISIS


#### Most Trusted: Local Medical Experts, Least Trusted: Trump

(On a scale of 0 to 10, how much do you trust each of the following to provide accurate information and helpful advice related to the coronavirus outbreak? Mean values illustrated)

Latinos in Colorado are most trusting of medical experts and their friends and family.

Governor Polis, and local leaders and organizations are relied upon more than members of Congress or the President.

Trump is the least trusted source. On a scale of 0 to 10, 44% rated him zero. Mean trust in Trump is lowest of all sources tested, at 2.8




# Despite Health and Economic Woes, Support for Stay-at-Home Precautions Remains Strong in Colorado

# State Re-Open Decisions Should be Based on Expert Advice, Not Trump Recommendations

Latinos in Colorado overwhelmingly (81%) prefer that their governor rely upon advice from health experts when he makes decisions about how to re-open state businesses and public agencies, and spaces.

Governors should move quickly to re-open businesses in their states, based on recommendations by President Trump to get people back to work, even if some health experts recommend against that

Governors should re-open businesses on a schedule that works for their state to get people back to work, using a gradual phased-in approach based on the advice of scientists and health experts
